For example, in the article, "Issue Overview: Should students have to wear school uniforms?", says, "School officials said that the students' "frame of mind" had improved and that discipline problems were down." While that may be true, it also says, "... schools could not restrict students' freedom of expression as long as the students' choices were not disruptive and did not affect the rights of others." This means that if wearing uniforms means focusing on school but restricting students' right to express themselves, many students would focus more on the problem than on school. Finally, wearing uniforms just restricts students from expressing themselves.

First, uniforms hide students' likes and dislikes, making them look the same. For Example, in the newspaper, "Should Students Have to Wear School Uniforms?", writes, "... school uniforms violate students' right to express themselves." It also states, "... the best interest of every child in our public schools and foster those who interest by means which advance independent, creative thinkers." This means that uniforms does not allow students to "say" or express themselves to others and make them look or "say" the same thing. As a result, uniforms violate students' right to express themselves.

Second, uniforms can go against peoples' religious beliefs. For instance, the article said, "... inscribed with the state motto, "Live Free or Die." It also said, "You can't be compelled to become a moving billboard for the state's messages." The Newsela article, "Should students have to wear school uniforms?" said that, "Proponents say that school uniforms make school safer for students. They say uniforms create a level playing field that reduces the influence a family's economic background has on a student's education. Uniforms also encourage children to focus on their studies rather than their clothes." (ProCon, paragraph 2) The author is saying that without uniforms students get distracted easily and focus on other unnecessary things instead of focusing on their studies. While it is important for students to focus on their education, there are hardships for parents that can't afford uniforms and are harmful for students because of bullying. Therefore, schools should not require uniforms when it brings negativity to students.

To begin with, parents with financial problems cannot afford school uniforms. According to bbc.com it states that, "A survey of about 1,000 UK parents by the children's society suggested those with children in state schools spent on average \$337 per year on secondary uniforms and \$315 per year for each primary school child." (Connor Gillies, paragraph 3) Furthermore, Sandra Douglas the person who founded the Back to School bank said that, "This isn't people on benefits. These are people who are working. Some people have two jobs and still can't manage." (Connor Gilliese, paragraph 1) This tells us that, if schools knew that parents with financial problems cannot afford uniforms, parents would not have to spend even more money on uniforms. All in all, schools that have uniforms are giving parents with financial problems more pressure on uniforms.

Second, it violates students' ability to express themselves, so it will affect them on developing their personalities. School-uniforms .procon.org stated that, "When students have to wear the same outfits, rather than being allowed to select clothes that suit their body types, they can suffer embarrassment at school." (ProcCon, paragraph 4) They also commented that, "In Sweden, a government agency, the school inspectorate, determined that uniforms were a human rights violation because dress and appearance should be considered an individual expression, decided by the students themselves." (ProCon, paragraph 2) This demonstrates that these pieces of evidence show that uniforms will make students think that their body types are not fit for uniforms and that will lead to bullying of other students based on their body types. In summary, uniforms affect students because of their body types and it can be harsh on their mental health.

Finally, it will affect people with religious beliefs, on the type of religious clothing they wear. The author procon.org claimed that before they changed the policy of religious clothing, they didn't allow students to wear their own religious clothing. For example, in the Newsela article, Should Students have to Wear School Uniforms, explains, "In 2000, a 9-year-old student was suspended twice for refusing to wear a school uniform because it went against his family's religious beliefs." (ProCon, paragraph 12) This states that schools are basically punishing students for clothing they have to wear because of religious beliefs, and forcing them to wear uniforms. As you can see, uniforms are harsh on people with religious beliefs.

To conclude, schools should consider the results of students when they wear uniforms. Uniforms, affects parents with financial problems, it violates students' ability to express themselves, and it affects people with religious beliefs. To sum it up, schools should not require school uniforms when uniforms affect students' mental health and lives because schools should acknowledge that students are still human and not their puppet.

Furthermore, Alfie Kohn also argued that "too much homework can cause considerable harm." (article 4, paragraph 20.) This shows hw is bad for kids because if we relieve kids of hw, they would definitely not be as stressed. In summary, homework makes kids stressed.

Secondly, homework stops students from having a social life. For example, according to an article kids are having too much stuff to do which causes them to not be able to have leisure time (article 4.) For instance, a student, Zach Masterman who is 15, states, "After putting in a full day of school, after school activities and choir practice, he comes home and dives into three hours of homework nightly" (article 4, paragraph 14.) The time used for homework could be used for more meaningful activities like spending time with family. In the end, homework takes up too much time in student lives.
